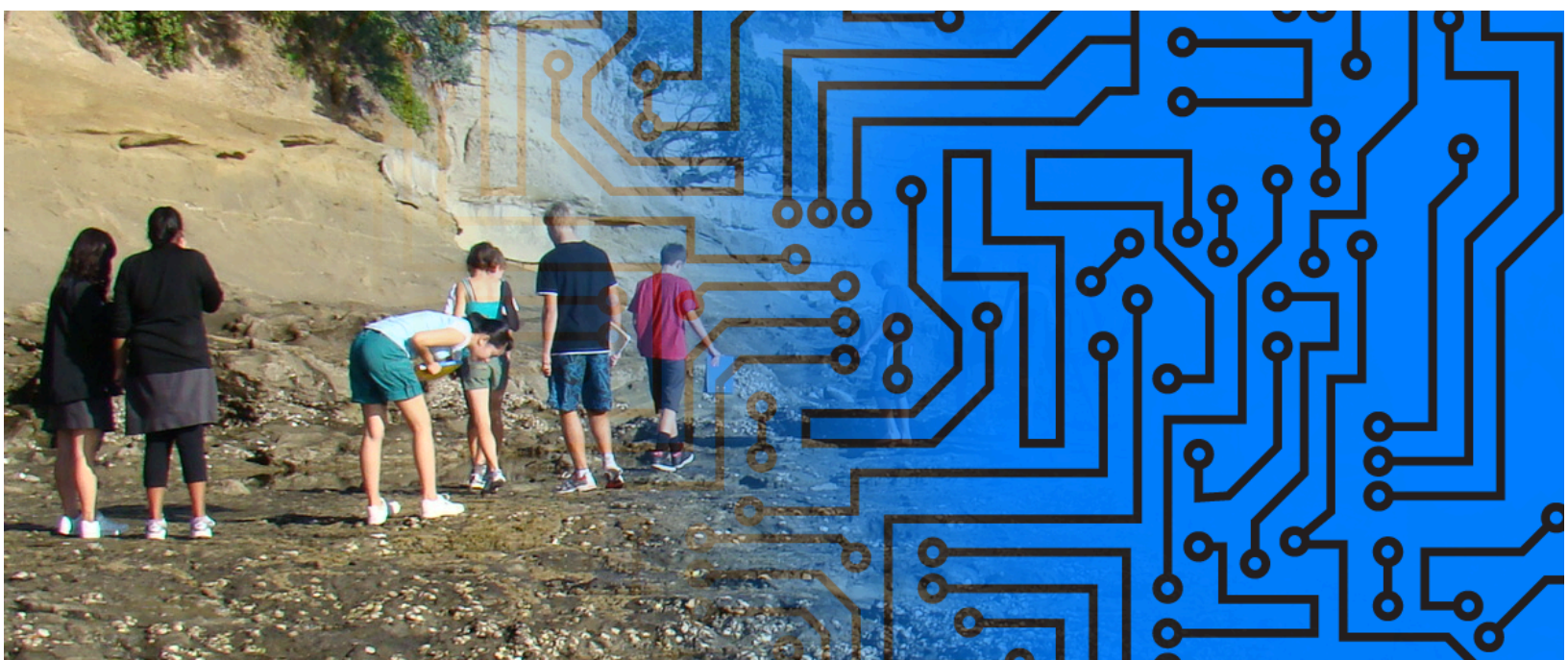


Alabama Digital Learning

You've heard of Rosa Parks, Martin Luther King Jr., and many famous names of the Montgomery Bus Boycott. In this presentation, we'll cover one of the lesser known names.
